President & General Manager Report

On behalf of the Tennis NT Board and staff we are pleased to present this report for the year ending 30 June 2019, another exciting year for tennis in the Northern Territory.

Whilst the year had some challenges, it also came with a number of highlights across the various areas of the sport including through feature events, performances on the court and the continued development of tennis at the grass roots.

Of significant note in 2018 was the delivery of the inaugural National Indigenous Tennis Carnival in Darwin. The event, which Tennis NT lobbied for as part of the Darwin International Tennis Centre negotiations, was a huge success and even featured on the Guardian newspapers worldwide photos of the day. We look further to continuing to develop this event for years to come.

Progress against the key pillars of Tennis NT's strategic plan is outlined below, however it is also important to note the strong focus Tennis NT continues to place on ensuring strong governance underpins our activity. With this we thank the tireless efforts of the entire Tennis NT Board for their ongoing commitment throughout 2018/19. During this period of change and growth we have asked a lot of the Board and to have such a dedicated and diligent group continuing to guide the organisation is a terrific strength.

In 2018/19 we again report on a pleasing financial result, a \$17,022 operating surplus. It is important to note that in the space of five years Tennis NT's turnover has nearly doubled, as such ensuring the organisation remains financially strong will be an ongoing focus of Tennis NT.

Everything Tennis NT does throughout the year would not be possible without the hard work and commitment of a number of key stakeholders. This includes the NT Government and Tennis Australia who continue to provide considerable support to Tennis NT. We also note the ongoing support we receive from valued partners. These partners, who are listed within this report, are crucial in being able to deliver quality events and programs and their support is appreciated.

It has again been great and somewhat inspiring to see the work that continues to be done across the sport by coaches, clubs, administrators, volunteers, players, officials and parents. Whilst sometimes this commitment can be thankless, everyone at Tennis NT is truly thankful for what you do on a daily basis. Last but certainly not least we would like to acknowledge the work of the Tennis NT staff throughout the twelve months. We often talk about being the lucky ones who get to work within the sport, but the ongoing passion, desire to continually improve and commitment to tennis is very much noted and certainly appreciated.

PARTICIPATION

Throughout the reporting period we have experienced strong grass roots participation including growth in player registrations and more than 10,000 territory students participating in school based programs. Having 54 schools engaged formally with tennis through the partnership program (up from 48 in 2017/18) provides a great opportunity for growth in clubs and centres. Casuarina St Primary taking home the Newcombe Medal award for Most Outstanding School was a fantastic result.

Tennis NT's Indigenous Program continued to evolve in 2018/19 with strong numbers in different areas of

the NT connecting with tennis. As this is a relatively new focus area for the sport, the model of delivery, partnerships that underpin the program and connection of the pathway will continue to develop, however Tennis NT's focus on ensuring all Territorians can experience tennis will always remain. We look forward to working with a variety of stakeholders in this space and connecting the grass roots with events such as the National Indigenous Tennis Carnival.

Moving forward a renewed focus has been placed on creating specific participation plans for different areas of the NT. This will feature collaboration through tailored approaches to attracting and retaining youth, continuing to develop the delivery network and seizing the opportunity within adult tennis.

PLACES TO PLAY

The NT Facilities Strategy remains the key driver for Tennis NT in this space with a number of key priority areas. Whilst the number one priority within the strategy has been achieved in Marrara, Tennis NT is wary that all facilities in the NT play integral roles in the development and delivery of the sport. Tennis NT continues to work closely with different stakeholders to ensure that our priorities are being furthered and that focus areas and potential developments are well informed. Ensuring quality facilities are available to all remains a focus and challenge for Tennis NT.

The Book a Court system is a key part of tennis' work in ensuring that people have access to courts 24/7. Having three affiliated venues across Darwin and Palmerston with the Book a Court system in place (a total of thirty five courts) provides a great platform for people to access tennis at their convenience. Tennis NT looks forward to enhancing this opportunity through more facilities and greater awareness.

COACHES

Like in previous years, the NT tennis community has again benefitted from a strong group of senior coaches who are passionate, skillful and committed to furthering the industry. Coach development and formal coach education underpins Tennis NT's work in developing a quality network of coaches across the NT. This is done predominantly through the delivery of Tennis Australia accredited coaching courses and tailored coach development activity within club environments. Tennis NT also aims to provide learning opportunities for coaches through involvement in interstate tours, coach forums and workshops.

In 2018/19 22 participants undertook coach education through three accredited courses. The delivery of these courses will continue to be something Tennis NT looks at providing, including how to take more courses to regional and remote areas.

TALENT DEVELOPMENT

Tennis NT has continued to support a talent development model that engages the quality coaches that exist within our environment. This has been a tricky balance with expectations from Tennis Australia and the NT Government governing our activity in some areas and minimal resources. In terms of results Territory athletes have again acquitted themselves at a high level during the 2018/19 period. This is highlighted by four interstate gold level wins, a National doubles title and a win against Victoria during the 2018 December Showdown. It is often easy to overlook results like these,

however it should be noted that these results are against the best players in respective age groups in the country and are results we should all be proud of.

Changes occurring at a national level will mean that we are likely to experience a talent system in the NT that differs to what we have experienced in 2018/19. Tennis NT acknowledges that success in this space relies heavily on various stakeholders and that the commitment of coaches, parents and players is all paramount to national success. We look forward to continuing this association.

TOURNAMENTS & COMPETITIONS

The highlights of the 2018/19 period were the return of the Darwin Tennis International and the running of the first ever National Indigenous Tennis Carnival. Following an extended period where we have been unable to showcase tennis in the Top End through high quality events, it was critically important and pleasing to deliver these events to a high standard. These events, coupled with the successful return of the Arafura Games ensured that tennis was very much back on the agenda when it came to profile events in Darwin.

Continuing to explore the future of competitive tennis in the NT was a focus of Tennis NT during the reporting period. A trial of a centrally administered social competition was undertaken in 2018/19 and whilst this direction was stalled, implementing a greater range of competitive opportunities will remain a focus for Tennis NT moving forward. This will need to be underpinned by strong club based programs, as such we look forward to developing this space collaboratively.

again we experienced strong participation in sanctioned events across the NT through both AMT and JT events, as well as ITF sanctioned junior, senior and wheelchair events. Continuing to offer good tournament experiences is vital in tennis' offering in the NT, as is continuing to focus on the development of officials and a strong tournament culture.

PROMOTION & ENGAGEMENT

Tennis NT has furthered its engagement with a variety of partners throughout the past twelve months with a desire to create connections with partners whose focus aligns with the strategic intent of Tennis NT. This has seen a number of new partners, particularly in the delivery of Tennis NT events. Tennis NT is hoping to continue to develop the sports' connection with partners, including the three tiers of Government, and ensure that these connections assist us, and our stakeholders, in furthering tennis in the NT.

A MOMENTOUS YEAR

As we reflect on the past 12 months in Australian tennis, it is Queensland's Ash Barty who is on top of the world. Her victory at Roland Garros was achieved with not only class, humility and by being true to herself but also by honouring her talent, her family and her team.

For all of us involved in the sport, it was incredibly heartening to see such a wonderful athlete and role model fulfil her dream of becoming a Grand Slam singles champion and the latest world No.1. Her ascension to the top of the singles rankings began when she captured the doubles title at the US Open with American CoCo Vandeweghe, the WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai and shared the Newcombe Medal with Alex de Minaur – the highest honour in Australian tennis.

Ash was not the only athlete achieving great heights. Victoria's Dylan Alcott continues to make history in wheelchair quads taking to the grass at Wimbledon for the first time in doubles, capturing his second US Open crown, returning to world No.1, winning his fifth consecutive Australian Open title and taking the inaugural singles title in Paris. He continues to be an inspiration and an incredible ambassador for our country and our sport.

The past year was filled with many on-court triumphs by our Aussie players in front of a home crowd. Alex de Minaur's maiden ATP singles title at the Sydney International, Sam Stosur's doubles crown at the Australian Open, the largest contingent of Aussies competing in the singles main draw since Australian Open 2000, the Davis Cup team qualifying in Adelaide for the new-look finals format later this year and our Fed Cup team's 3-2 victory over Belarus in Brisbane sending Australia to the final for the first time in 26 years. Eyes around the country will be glued to Perth in November to watch our Aussie team, captained by Alicia Molik, take on France for a shot to regain the cup 45 years since our last one.

A NEW ERA IN AUSTRALIAN TENNIS

Our major focus for the past year has been increasing resources on the ground through greater

investment into regional development via our Member Associations. This has led to the creation of more than 50 new jobs across the country to deliver tennis to the next generation and attract more adults back to the sport through social play.

We all know that being able to hold world-class events with more opportunities for the top players to start their season here in Australia is one of the most important factors in inspiring future generations to the sport.

With this in mind we've completely reinvented the summer and next January will be the biggest launch of the global tennis calendar with the introduction of a brand new men's teams event, the ATP Cup in Brisbane, Perth and Sydney, the new combined men's and women's Adelaide International and improved women's events in Hobart and Brisbane.

All of this leading into the pinnacle event on our calendar, the Australian Open, and with it the rollout of our new Australian tennis strategy. We have some big ambitions to grow our sport even further over the next five years as well as introduce a women's teams event to the summer line-up. It's because of our team's hard work over the past decade that we are in such a strong position to do this.

The dedication and professionalism shown by each member of our tennis community from players, coaches, volunteers, officials, administrators and fans is nothing short of phenomenal. As we continue to invest in our sport and grow the game we all love, the commitment and cooperation you demonstrate is what allows us to build on our success.

We look forward to another momentous year ahead.

Participation Leaders

One of the many resources utilised in the Northern Territory in order to drive promotional activities is the Participation Leader position. The provision of this role also assists in the creation of necessary relationships within all areas, such as schools, clubs and communities in order to achieve the stable and sustainable growth witnessed from year to year.

The Participation Leader is the first point of call for Territory Clubs when it comes to programs and initiatives centered around participation in tennis. This includes but is not limited to ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, Fitbit Cardio Tennis, Schools Programs, the and Community Play.

ANZ Tennis Hot Shots

ANZ Tennis Hot Shots (ANZTHS), incorporating smaller courts, smaller racquets and low-compression tennis balls, is the fun and easy way to learn tennis.

In 2017-18 there were six registered ANZTHS deliverers in the Northern Territory providing programs participants. These deliverers have assistant coaches working under them delivering Hot Shots at their clubs and in school programs. There were twenty three Assistant coaches used throughout the Territory during this period.

Places To Play

July 2018 saw the official opening of the Darwin International Tennis Centre. The centre services the northern region of Darwin, providing sixteen plexipave courts, including two full sized covered courts and five covered ANZ Tennis Hot Shots courts.. This facility coming to fruition has long been a strategic priority of Tennis NT and Tennis Australia and places the growth of tennis through both new events and grass roots participation at the forefront.




National Programs

Book A Court Program

Book a Court is an online court booking and payment platform for affiliated tennis clubs. It's easy to use for both players and club administrators, which means more time on court for everyone. When players book a court online they're sent a PIN for direct access to their court, or if there is no connected pin pad available, the player is provided with alternative instructions to access the court.

Tennis Australia is placing significant emphasis on providing innovation in access to tennis venues across Australia, as such they provided extra funding for forty venues nationwide, Tennis NT was allocated one of the funding payments which allowed the installation of Book a Court at the Gardens Tennis Club. This gave Tennis NT three affiliates across the Darwin and Palmerston region with the Book a Court System, allowing people to book on thirty five courts twenty four hours a day. Tennis NT intends to work together with other affiliated venues in exploring suitable options to cater for more Book a Court Systems and to enhance the offering the system offers to the community.



Tennis in Schools

Tennis Australia's Partnership and Play School Tennis Programs

During 2018-19 the Australian Government's Sporting Schools Program continued to assist Territory schools to actively promote sport as part of their PE lessons. Schools apply for funding through the program and then select its sport of choice, Tennis Australia offers two programs as part of the Sporting Schools initiative, based on the ANZ Tennis Hot Shots program. The Partnership and Play Programs are made up of fun tennis activities which support skill acquisition and movement all whilst 'playing the game' in a meaningful way.

Participation Report

Player Registration

During 2018/19 we experienced the introduction of a new facility, the reintroduction of a previously affiliated facility as an affiliate and the changeover of management of a key facility. This has provided tennis in the NT with a great opportunity to collaboratively develop tennis across the NT. Overall there was an increase within the Northern Territory of 2.8% following on from the decrease of 5.8% in 2011/18. Tennis NT will continue to work with all regions and assist the clubs in an effort to regain the growth trends across the Territory.

Racquets & Red Dust

Tennis NT has continued the Indigenous Tennis Program, unveiling its name as The Racquets and Red Dust Program during the 2018/19 Financial Year.

During this period, the program was able to deliver tennis at twenty four remote communities, as well as three classes of the Darwin Region Stars Program for middle school aged Indigenous girls. The program saw a growth from eight hundred and eighty four participants the 2017/18 financial year, to one thousand six hundred and twenty six in the 2018/19 financial year. As the program is in its infancy, the challenge of creating sustainable programs and pathways remains. Tennis NT intends to continue to develop strong community based partnerships to assist in these endeavors.

The program has successfully delivered the following –

- The continuation of quality delivery tennis programs during and after school hours
- The expansion of both in school and after school programs through the Katherine Region.
- Developing of new and strengthening of existing relationships with Regional Councils, the Department of Education who invites us to their Health, Sports & Athletic Carnivals continually and this allows us to conduct mini inter-community competition due to the cluster of remote schools that attend these events.
- The delivery of Tennis NT's second Regional Talent Camp in Katherine where twenty students attended from the Roper Gulf Region.
- Creating a *pathway* which is provided through intra and inter-community competition, regional carnivals and talent camps. This allows us to provide a meaningful pathway in the sport and allow for outcomes relevant to health and education to be further embedded within the Program. This pathway culminates in the *National Indigenous Tennis Carnival*.

Events Calendar

The Northern Territory had another busy tournament schedule with 1 Australian Pro Tour tournament, 2 ITF Junior Grade five tournaments, one ITF Futures tournament, eight Australian Money Tournaments, ten Junior Tour tournaments and eleven Junior Development Series tournaments.

Australian Money Tournaments (AMTs)

AMTs are semi-professional tournaments introduced by Tennis Australia in 2006. They are designed to create quality match play opportunities and help with the transition of post junior athletes.

The Northern Territory conducted one Platinum; one Gold; one Silver and five Bronze AMTs. Of the eight AMT tournaments, sixteen events offered Australian Ranking Points and prize money. Three hundred and six competitors entered which is a decrease of 18.18% over the previous reporting period.

Junior Tournament (JT)

The JT is an umbrella tour that provides a competition pathway for aspiring junior players. These tournaments offer Australian Ranking points across the 12/U, 14/U and 16/U age groups.

The Northern Territory conducted two Gold; one Silver and seven Bronze JT tournaments during the reporting period.

Of these ten JT tournaments, ninety five events offered Australian Ranking Points for both boys and girls across the three age groups. One thousand and seventy five competitors entered which was an increase of 85% over the previous reporting period.

Junior Development Series (JDS)

The JDS sits under the JT in the Competition Pathway and is designed for beginner to interme-

diate players, giving them their first tournament experience. These tournaments are conducted around Australia.

Now in its sixth year the JDS attracted three hundred and thirty one competitors over the eleven tournaments that were on offer across the Northern Territory. This is a decrease of 28.97% compared to the previous reporting period.

Open Points Circuit

The *Open Points Circuit* (OPC) is comprised of eight tournaments conducted across the Northern Territory. This circuit provides individuals with the opportunity to compete for OPC points as well as a cash bonus of \$500 for the winning Male and winning Female at the end of the circuit. This bonus is awarded at the Annual Awards Night. The OPC tournaments and winners are:

Darwin Open

In 2019, the Darwin Open continued as an AMT Gold, and was the final events in a swing of four tournaments intended to entice interstate competitors to compete in the NTs mini-circuit, which commenced with two ITF Junior Internationals.

The 2019 Darwin Open attracted fifty six entries across the events. Overall, this event showed a 30% decrease from the 2018 entries. This is likely in part to the tournament sitting as the final of four events.

Ex-Territorian Michael Shepheard once again returned to the NT in fine form, managing to secure the Men's Singles Champion title before backing it up in the Men's Doubles, securing dual titles with partner, Darwin-local, Peter Politis.

As always, the success of such events is reliant on the group of devoted officials who once again helped make the Darwin Open such a success.

93rd NT Open Championships

The 93rd NT Open Championships, which was an AMT Platinum and JT bronze event, attracted one hundred and sixty five entries across sixteen events. Overall event entries decreased by 45%, likely due to the separation of the JDS from the rest of the event.

2019 saw a new cache of champions ready to claim the title and have their names etched into the Parap Cup (Men's Trophy) and Barden Trophy (Women's Trophy), with the no returning champions claiming the crowns this year.

In a case of déjà vu, the women's singles finals saw Natasha Russell (AUS) and Monique Barry (NZL), finalists of the NT Junior International, once again battling it out for the title. In a match the lasted nearly 2.5 hours, Barry pushed Russell to the third set but was unable to keep the momentum going, with Russell once again defeating her, this time to claim the 93rd NT Open Championships Women's Singles crown.

The Men's singles saw second seed Cooper White (VIC) claim the title of Men's Singles Champion against opponent Adam Hecimovic of New South Wales.

Tennis NT would like to acknowledge the City of Darwin for their ongoing sponsorship of both tournaments, along with those who partnered with Tennis NT for these events, Crocodylus Park and People's Choice Credit Union.

Tennis NT would also like to thank the dedicated group of officials and staff who continue to help make the NT Open Championships such a success.

Darwin and NT Junior Championships

Due to changes within the Australian Junior Tournament Calendar, the Darwin and NT Junior Championship JT Gold events were not conducted within the 2018-19 financial year. As such, they will be covered within the 2019-20 Annual Report.

Intra-Territory Travel Grant

Throughout 2018-19 travel grants continued to be offered to tournament competitors and coaches traveling to Territory tournaments.

The travel grant continues to provide funding to those athletes and coaches travelling outside their home region to attend intra-Territory events / tournaments.

Tennis NT acknowledges People's Choice Credit Union for their valuable support.

Officials Development

Three officials' development opportunities were conducted during the reporting period. These were conducted at the Darwin Tennis International, Darwin Junior International and 93rd NT Open Championships.

2018 saw in beginning of the High Performance Officiating Program, run through the NT Institute of Sport. Tennis was one of 9 sports whose officials received a place within the program with Gary Bigg receiving a mentoring position, with Virginia Moore as mentee. This program provided an opportunity for personal growth and an opportunity to give back to the officiating community with the NT.

2019 saw an increase in the number of tennis officials engaging in the NTIS High Performance Officiating Program, with both Jennifer Roe (Darwin) and Leanne Usher (Alice Springs) receiv-

ing mentee positions, with Virginia Moore (Alice Springs) mentoring Jennifer and Erin Bormann (Darwin) working with Leanne. The program, which is only in its second year, is continuing to grow and develop better ways of increasing the skills and confidence of those officials engaged within the program.

Tennis NT appreciates the effort those currently within the officiating space continually put in the time and effort into training and supporting each other, along with new officials beginning their journeys.

As always, the summer of tennis proved a busy time for the local Alice Springs Officials, with a select few of them earning their places at the Playford Challenger, prior to their annual pilgrimage to the Australian Open. This year however, saw the first of the new Darwin Line Umpires join the fray, starting the year at the Playford Challenger with the team from Alice Springs, before making their way to the Australian Open.

The main highlight for the 2019 Australian Open was not only the return of five of Alice Springs top line umpires (Gary Bigg, Kathryn Brak, Gus Matarazzo, Virginia Moore and Leanne Usher), but also the beginning of the Darwin Line Umpires reaching the top, with Chris McLachlan making his debut.

This was an increase of 11.27% over the previous reporting period. The perceived increase was brought about by the addition of three new ITF events to the NT calendar, which saw a dual Men's & Women's Pro Tour move to Darwin, the introduction of a second ITF Junior Event and an ITF Futures event as part of the Arafura Games.

Representative Teams

2018 Australian Teams Championships

Tennis NT fielded teams in the boys and girls and 14 age groups. The boys twelves finished twelfth of twelve teams while the boys fourteens finished sixth of twelve teams. The girls twelve's finished tenth of twelve teams and the girls 14s finished tenth of twelve teams.

On the way to their sixth placed finish the boys fourteens team of Jett Leong, Patrick Findlay and Nicolas Tremblay became the first Territory team to win against a Victorian side in the event.

2018 Queensland Regional Junior Teams Carnival

Tennis NT was represented in all divisions of the 2017 Queensland Junior Teams Carnival. The event held in December 2018 comprised mixed teams of six players in the elevens, thirteens, fifteens, and seventeens age groups.

The elevens placed twelfth of sixteen, the thirteens thirteenth of sixteen, the fifteens fourth of sixteen and the seventeens fourteenth of fourteen. Participation in the Queensland Junior Teams Carnival provides vital representative opportunities and enables many Territory players to experience their first — Interstate tennis competition at an appropriate standard.

Providing our older athletes the opportunity to represent the Territory is a particular bonus.

2018 School Sport Australia Bruce Cup

The Northern Territory team travelled to Adelaide for the 2018 Bruce Cup. In what proved a

very challenging week the team won 11.31% of rubbers finishing eighth of the eight teams.

Tennis NT continued to support school sport in trials, skill sessions, gala days, the twelve and under school sport exchange and the Bruce Cup. In exchange our coaches benefit from experiencing firsthand the student management strategies and practices employed by the teachers involved in school sport.



Coach Development

Coach Education

During the 2018-19 reporting year two Tennis Australia coach education courses were held in Darwin

In July 2018 a Community Coaching Course was completed with eight participants.

In October 2018 a Junior Development Course commenced with seven participants.

In May 2019 a Community Coaching Course was held attracting seven participants.

Coach Development

Tennis NT continued to provide unique coach development opportunities. These focused on club centered coach development through coach team workshops and presentations, tour reports on individual players with coach recommendations, reports on individual coach sessions with active feedback through to individual coach mentor sessions encompassing both coaching practice and business practices. The individual nature of many of these coach development opportunities allowed messages to be tailored specifically to the challenges each individual coach faces.

2019 Australian Grand Slam Coaches Conference

Two NT coaches attended the 2019 Australian Grand Slam Coaches Conference held in Melbourne just prior to the Australian Open.



Travel Assistance to Private Coaches

The Talent Development Coaches program gave way to a more flexible private coach travel assistance program to encourage private coaches to support their players at National events. In the reporting year two NT Coaches received such support.

Jett Leong was one of four players selected on Tennis Australia's 14s European tour returning high praise from the tour coach and a best performance of making a semi-final in the Muller Junior Cup Ulm in Germany.

In July Perter Politis won the fourteens singles and doubles in the Rod Laver Queensland Junior Championships and then continued his good performances in his early ITF events leading to an invitation from Australia's National Selectors to compete in the B2 ITF event in Fiji.

In October at the fourteens Australian Clay Court Championships in Canberra Jett Leong and Peter combined Politis to win the fourteens doubles title, making them the first all NT doubles team to win a National Doubles Title. Leong remained in Canberra to win the fourteens singles at the Canberra Junior Open.

In the December Showdown Australian Teams event Jett teamed with Patrick Findlay from Alice Springs and Nicolas Tremblay from Darwin to become the first NT team to beat Victoria in the event eventually finishing sixth overall out of the twelve teams competing.

With Leong relocating to further his tennis at Tennis Australia's Melbourne National Academy and Peter Politis a year older and moving out of the talent space the first half of 2019 saw a

Without any players in the system qualifying for Tennis Australia tier two criteria and with limited Tennis NT coaching resources a less focused coaching program spread across a range of age groups was implemented in semester one 2019. This involved a thirteen years plus male and female group training twice a week with players in the twelves space continuing to be offered the one session a week. This placed a heavy reliance on the club structure to do the extra work needed for players to emerge as nationally competitive.

Building our Base

With the Essington International Tennis Academy exiting the pathway program due to a change of school priorities and the racquets and Red Dust Indigenous program still in its infancy the onus to bring talented players to tennis continues to rest heavily on our seven affiliated clubs across the Territory.

Club Talent Days

Tennis NT CTDM delivered three Talent Development Camps and two club based Talent Days together impacting ten private coaches and one hundred and nine athletes.

Athlete Development

Super 10s

Super 10s was one of the highlights of the talent year. The seasons held in Darwin and Palmerston collectively attracted twenty eight individual players including one from Katherine. These seasons were followed by the Talent 10s match play camp which involved four coaches and sixteen players including one from Katherine and two from Alice Springs. From the camp five players (three boys and two girls) and two coaches were selected to form the NT contingent that participated in the 2018 Talent 10s National Camp.

Athlete Tournament Support

Tennis NT supported individuals on tour by sending coaches to all three Platinum events plus the Bruce Cup. In the reporting year this included the October 2018 Australian Clay Court Championships in Canberra (NT CTDM plus six players and one private Coach), the October 2018 Bruce Cup in Adelaide (NT CTDM plus fourteen players) the December 2018 Australian Championships in Melbourne (NT CTDM plus twelve players plus three private coaches) and the April 2019 Australian Clay Court Championships in Canberra (Tennis NT CTDM plus five players and one private coach). (Clay Courts and Grass Courts switched time frames) The best result during these events was Jett Leong and Peter Politis winning the 2018 fourteens Australian Clay Court Doubles final and Tegan Genockey being a finalist at the 2019 twelve Girls Australian Clay Court Doubles.

Looking Forward

It's important to acknowledge our outstanding on court performances in the reporting period. This has included five wins in interstate Gold level singles events.

While we acknowledge these achievements Tennis NT know that our emerging players will determine our future success. Understanding and replicating the training standard under taken by current players and support from coaches and parents are required to reach a nationally competitive standard.

Tennis NT will continue to host discussions with our local coaching network and Tennis Australia's Performance Department around our player development structure and pathways to provide the best possible opportunities for future territory player success.

The continuing support of the NT's centre managers in the Athlete Development space needs to be acknowledged. Without exception they have generously and enthusiastically provided their facilities, where required. To the coaches that go above and beyond expectations to enhance the development of our next group of nationally competitive players, we thank you for your work.

Lastly we would like to thank those within our Territory Tennis community that have provided all those on the player development pathway the crucial personal support needed to pursue their dreams.



National Indigenous Tennis Carnival

National Indigenous Tennis Carnival - 'A Celebration of Culture through Tennis'

The inaugural National Indigenous Tennis Carnival was held at the Darwin International Tennis Centre from September 6-9 in 2018. The event is to be held annually in Darwin moving forward, it allows Indigenous youth of all tennis abilities the chance to celebrate a fusion of tennis and culture.

In 2018, the Racquets and Red Dust Program provided ninety two of the two hundred participants at the carnival, they came from the following communities Barunga, Beswick (Wugularr), Jilkminggan, Mataranka, Jabiru, Tiwi Islands, Belyuen and Alice Springs.

A key part of the Carnival were the off court activities, Tennis NT worked closely with both the event manager and Larrakia Nation to provide cultural workshops and a community concert that featured Young Australian of the Year, Baker Boy. The concert was attended by over one thousand members of the general public, as well as all Carnival participants and staff.

During the carnival there were two streams, with a participation stream for those participants with a brief tennis background and a tournament stream for the more accomplished players. As well as tennis, participants took part in culture activities and workshops.



ITF World Tennis Tour - Australian Pro Tour

2018 saw the return of the Pro Tour to Darwin on September 24 – 30, 2018 for the *Darwin Tennis International* after a six-year hiatus. It was a dual event with a Women's 60k joining the Men's 25k, previously hosted in Alice Springs. The tournament is now the second week of the Northern Circuit on the ITF Pro Circuit calendar (Cairns, Darwin, Brisbane, Toowoomba) on the Australian Pro Tour.

Tennis NT would like to gratefully acknowledge the partners of the *Darwin Tennis International*, without whom the event wouldn't be as fantastic an event as it is. Partner for 2018 were Fusion Displays, Majestix Media and Spotless, together with ongoing significant investment from Tennis Australia.

In a strange turn of events, before the Main Draw of the *Darwin Tennis International* even got underway, the week started with a Women's Singles Final. Inclement weather in Cairns had seen players Astra Sharma (AUS) and Destanee Aiava (AUS) unable to complete their match in Cairns. With both players departing for Darwin the following day, it was arranged for the *Cairns Tennis International* Women's Singles final to be completed in Darwin. Many thanks to the team of ball kids, staff and officials who pitched in at the last minute give the match a proper finals feel.

Thirty-four countries were represented at the *Darwin Tennis International*, with the significant increase in represented countries thanks to the inclusion of the Women's event. The Men's Singles Qualifying saw four NT players vying for positions in the Main Draw, with all unfortunately falling throughout the Qualifying event.

Whilst the increased demands of the dual event saw numerous interstate and international officials descend on Darwin, the officiating team was not without representation from across the NT, with a contingent of dedicated Line Umpires from Alice Springs making their way to Darwin, along with the new crop of Darwin Line Umpires taking part, most of whom were working their first International event. Last but by no means least, thank you to the ball kids who helped make the finals a memorable event.

Tennis NT extends its thanks to the host venue, Tennis World Darwin and the numerous staff and volunteers who gave their time to make the return of the Pro Circuit to Darwin a memorable one.

Whilst it was pleasing to bring professional tennis back to Darwin, unfortunately the Alice Springs Pro Tour ceased in 2018. Tennis NT hopes to bring quality events back to Central Australian in the future.

ITF World Tennis Tour - Juniors

2019 saw the return of not only the Darwin Junior International (Grade 5), an ITF World Tennis Tour Junior event, but also the addition of a second ITF Junior Event in the NT Junior International. The tournaments for the beginning of a 4 tournament swing in Darwin.

Across the 2 events there were ten countries represented within the Girls and Boys draws, consisting of Australia, Japan, Thailand, France, the United States of America, Malaysia, Korea, Papua New Guinea, New Caledonia and New Zealand. It also provided opportunity for eleven

Northern Territory athletes from Darwin and Alice Springs to compete in an International Junior event.

There were no Territorians to make the finals this year, however the local players proved their grit and determination by putting in a strong display against their interstate and international opponents.

Arafura Games

April 2019 marked the return of the Arafura Games to Darwin, with Tennis NT hosting 2 events as part of the Games.

The Teams Event saw eight teams battling it out for the top spot, with participants from Darwin, Chinese Taipei, East Kalimantan, Papua, and Queensland. In a finals fraught with rain delays, it was Chinese Taipei that claimed the Teams Event crown.

Arafura 2019 also saw the return of Wheelchair Tennis to the NT, with the UNIQLO Wheelchair Tennis Tour brining an ITF Future Series event to the games. This event showcased some of the up and coming stars of Australian Wheelchair Tennis, along with players from Timor-Leste. The event was also utilized as a training camp for a group of Junior Players, three of whom then went on to successful compete at the BNP Paribas World Team Cup where they won the Junior title.

Notes to and forming part of the Financial Statements for the year ended 30 June 2019

Note 1

Summary of Accounting Policies

The accounting policies adopted by the Association are stated in order to assist in a general understanding of the Financial Statements. These policies have been consistently applied except as otherwise indicated.

Reporting entity

The Association is not a reporting entity because in the Board's opinion there are likely to exist users who are able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy all of their information needs, and these accounts are therefore "special purpose accounts" that have been prepared solely to meet the requirements of the Constitution and the Associations Act.

Accounting policies

The Financial Report has been prepared under the historical cost conventions and does not take into account changing money values except to the extent that they are reflected in the revaluation of certain assets.

In order for the Financial Report to present fairly the state of affairs of the Association and the results of the Association for the year, Australian Accounting Standards have been adopted to the extent disclosed in this note.

Government Grants

(a) Grants Reciprocal grants

Grants received on the condition that specified services should be delivered or conditions fulfilled are considered reciprocal. Such grants are initially recognised as a liability and revenue recognised as services are performed or conditions fulfilled.

(b) Non-reciprocal grants

Where a grant is received where there is no performance obligation or return obligation, revenue is recognised when the grant is received or receivable.

Property, Plant & Equipment

(I) Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost or deemed cost less accumulated depreciation. Cost includes expenditures that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. The cost of constructed assets includes the cost of materials, direct labour, the initial estimate, where relevant, of the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located, and an appropriate proportion of production overheads. Where parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

(II) Subsequent costs

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only when it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Company. Ongoing repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred.

(III) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment.

The estimated useful lives in the current and comparative periods are as follows:

Buildings 30-40 years
 Courts & Court equipment 5-40 years
 Plant and equipment 4-10 years
 Landscaping 40 years
 Computer equipment 3-5 years
 Furniture and fittings 5-30 years

Income received in advance

The liability for income received in advance is the unutilised amounts of grants/other revenue received on the condition that specified services are delivered or conditions are fulfilled. The services are usually provided or the conditions usually fulfilled within 12 months of receipt of the grant. Where the amount received is in respect of services to be provided over a period that exceeds 12 months after the reporting date or the conditions will only be satisfied more than 12 months after the reporting date, the liability is discounted and presented as non-current.

Employee Entitlements

The amounts expected to be paid to employees for their pro rata entitlement to annual leave and long service leave are accrued annually at current pay rates.

Income tax

The Association is of the opinion that it is not subject to income tax.

New accounting standards

During the period the Association adopted the requirements of AASB 9 Financial Instruments to assess for impairment of its trade and other receivables. The Association makes use of a simplified approach in accounting for trade and other receivables and records the loss allowance at the amount equal to the expected lifetime credit losses. In using this practical expedient, the Association uses its historical experience, external indicators and forward-looking information to calculate its expected credit losses using a provision matrix.

This represents insurance and events allocations to the next financial year

Note 3

Property, Plant and Equipment

During 2018-19, \$61,950 was spent on improvements to the redevelopment project. Construction of the Darwin International Tennis Centre was completed in June 2018 with the related assets being depreciated from this date.

Note 4

Income Received in Advance

Income received in advance of \$5,512 relates to entry fees and room hire for July 2019

Note 5

Officials Development Fund

In 2010, Tennis NT was successful in securing \$2,846 of 'unclaimed monies' from the dissolved *Northern Territory Tennis Umpires Association*. This group ceased to function during the period 1996-97 and the remaining funds held in their bank account were surrendered by the bank in 2004 to the *Australian Securities and Investments Commission*. The money is held in trust for Officials Development.

An additional amount of \$7,154 has been raised and endorsed by the board in September 2014.

Note 6

TCA-NT Scholarship Fund

In 2006, TCA-NT dissolved and instructed that its residual funds be given to Tennis NT on the provision that the funds be held in trust as a scholarship fund, specifically for coach education and development. This was increased to \$20,200 endorsed by the board in September 2014. An amount of \$3,300 has been spent up to this period.

Note 7

Facility Development Fund Reserve

In 2014, Tennis NT Board endorsed and committed \$200,000 to the Facility Development Fund for the development of facilities throughout Northern Territory. An amount of \$24,028 has been spent up to this period.

Note 9

New accounting standards and interpretations not yet adopted

The following accounting standards, amendments to accounting standards and interpretations have been identified as those which may impact the Association in the period of initial adoption. They were available for early adoption for the Association's annual reporting period beginning 1 July 2018, but have not been applied in preparing this financial report. The Association's assessment of the new and amended pronouncements that are relevant to the Association but applicable in future reporting periods is set out below.

AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers becomes mandatory for the Association's financial statements for the period beginning on 1 July 2019 and establishes a comprehensive framework for determining whether, how much and when revenue is recognised. The standard replaces existing revenue recognition guidance. The Association has undertaken an assessment of the impact of AASB 15 and anticipate that initial adoption of the Standard will not have a material impact on the Association's financial statements. The Association has decided not to early adopt this new standard.

AASB 16 Leases is mandatory for the Association's financial statements for the period beginning on 1 July 2019 and introduces a single, on-balance sheet accounting model for lessees. A lessee recognises a right-of-use asset representing its right to use the underlying asset and a lease liability representing its obligation to make lease payments. There are optional exemptions for short-term leases and leases of low value items. Lessor accounting remains similar to the current standard - i.e. lessors continue to classify leases as finance or operational expenses.

The Association has completed an initial assessment of the potential impact on its financial statements but has not yet completed its detailed assessment. The actual impact of applying AASB 16 on the financial statements in the period of initial application will depend on future economic conditions, including the assessment of Association's incremental rate, the composition of the Association's lease portfolio at that date, the Association's latest assessment of whether it will exercise any lease renewal options and the extent to which the Association chooses to use practical expedients and recognition exemptions.

The initial adoption of AASB 16 will not have a material impact on the Association. The Association has decided not to early adopt this new standard.

AASB 1058 Income of Not-for-Profit Entities becomes mandatory for the Association's financial statements for the period beginning on 1 July 2019 and establishes principles for NFP entities that apply specifically to transactions where the consideration to acquire an asset is significantly less than fair value principally to enable a NFP Association to further its objectives; and to volunteer services received. The directors have undertaken an assessment of the impact of AASB 1058 and anticipate that initial adoption of the Standard will not have a material impact on the Association's financial statements. The Association has decided not to early adopt this new standard.

Note 10

Subsequent events

At the reporting date there had been no change to matters known to the board pertaining to design issues at the Marrara Tennis Centre. The impact of these issues remained unknown, however the board does not expect any significant financial impacts.
