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PRESIDENT'S REPORT



When sitting down to write this President's Report, I'm finding myself reflecting on the 2019/20 financial year as one of many challenges and triumphs. This will be my final report

to you all as President; as I will be stepping down to commence a new role heading up a sport research centre and spending more time with my family. Like so many of you, 2020 has provided me with time to reflect on what is important and what is necessary. With a husband who works on the front line in Intensive Care, and a young son navigating remote schooling, it is time for me to support my family through this challenging time. I would like to thank you all for making me so welcome as President; it was anything if not uneventful, with three CEOs, a season of bushfires, floods, roll-out of new programs and a pandemic to juggle over the past two years, but I hope that I did you all proud and I sincerely thank you all for your support in the role. It was an honour and a privilege to be Tennis Victoria's first female President, and I look forward to continued engagement with the sport as a regular director and a club member into 2021.

Looking back to 2019, Victorian tennis came through the Winter months to head towards a Summer full of

exciting new initiatives, especially the launch of Open Court Sessions with the aim to bring players who have stopped playing as teenagers or young adults back to the tennis courts across the state.

We congratulated many award winners at our Champions Dinner in October, most notably Kyvalley Tennis Club as Most Outstanding Club, and Norm Cahill recognised as a very worthy Victorian Spirit of Tennis recipient.



With the warmer weather upon us and the Summer of Tennis on its way, January saw many Victorians put to the test once again with the impending impact of the bushfires raging across the state. Many areas across regional Victoria were under threat which impacted the livelihoods, facilities and communities of many of our tennis community. We are so proud of how tennis rallied around to support and for some, rebuild.

However, it wasn't long before a new challenge lay ahead with the unprecedented impact of COVID-19 hitting Australia. The change to our

lives in March as the nation was shut down seems so very long ago now. As I write this, our state is currently in Stage 4 lockdown meaning we have no tennis activity in Metropolitan Melbourne and limited play in regional Victoria in Stage 2. This has been an extremely difficult time for all of our community. Not playing, coaching, officiating or volunteering in tennis is not what we signed up for, and a world without it has been sad and frustrating for all of us. Our role is to provide playing opportunities, to promote and support this great game at the grass roots, and seeing courts closed across the state is not in our DNA. However, protecting the health and safety of our community is the most important role we have, and we must adhere to and enforce Government guidelines and restrictions. Tennis will return one day, hopefully soon, and when it does, we will see the smiling faces and enjoyment for years to come.

COVID-19 has given us many challenges and it will continue to do so. It is important that we protect the future of our sport. There are many opportunities for people to participate in tennis, in a variety of ways, and we want to make sure that we are set up to ensure that tennis clubs and tennis in Victoria can continue to thrive well into the future.

Our finances for 2019/20 are reflected later in this report. In a year of great change, we have managed to record a surplus. This is due to the hard work by the team to ensure that in the final months of this financial year, we

have best set ourselves up for what is going to be a difficult year ahead and one with many challenges as we aim to rebuild after the impact of COVID-19. We would like to particularly acknowledge the support provided by the Victorian Government and the Melbourne Olympic Park Trust in this regard, through providing a variety of grants and support initiatives to ourselves and our clubs to keep our collective heads above water. We would not have had this financial result without substantial support from the State Government during this time of crisis.

2020 saw us reach the end of the previous strategic plan and the emergence of the new strategic plan. We had hoped to bring this strategic plan to our tennis community much earlier this year for your feedback and input, to help us set our direction for the next 5 years for tennis in Victoria. We will, however, be embarking on this process in the next few months, and we look forward to engaging with you to imagine our recovery to a post-COVID normal. This plan will also ensure our financial sustainability as both tennis, and the broader sport sector, regroup and rebuild.

As always, an enormous thank you to my fellow Directors at Tennis Victoria and particularly to my Vice President Anna Speedie and Treasurer Phil Crouch. We have spent more (virtual) hours together this year than ever before, and I appreciate all of the time, dedication and genuine engagement with navigating our sport through this incredibly difficult time.

Thank you to our independent committees (listed on page 52) Chaired by Ian Jenkins (Audit and Risk Committee) and Bronwyn Parry (Nominations Committee). Thank you to all members of all Committees and Advisory Groups for your commitment to the sport. This is a team effort and we cannot do it without you.

To the many partners of Tennis Victoria who continue to support our organisation, we owe them our ongoing gratitude for their financial and in-kind support of tennis in Victoria, with particular thanks to our national counterparts at Tennis Australia, the Victorian State Government and VicHealth.

Thank you to the Tennis Victoria team of staff lead by Chief Executive Ruth Holdaway. You have all worked over and above in terribly difficult times, and you have done so with grace and a dedication to your roles, your sport and your community. For many of you, this has required periods of unpaid leave or stand down, and I understand the impact this has had on so many of you. Thank you for holding in there, there is light at the end of the tunnel now. On behalf of the Victorian tennis community, we thank you.

Finally, and most importantly, to every single volunteer, administrator, coach and player - thank you all so much for your commitment and dedication to tennis in Victoria. You all truly are the lifeblood of the sport and without your continued effort, passion and

commitment, the results shared throughout this report wouldn't be what they are without you all. Wishing you all the very best for a quite different summer of tennis, and I look forward to watching us all come together and rebuild our sport into 2021.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT



In many ways 2019-20 was a year of firsts: 'Get Your Racquet On', the first national participation advertising campaign to attract adults to play tennis; the first year of Open Court Sessions, our new social

play offer to bring people who used to play, back to the game in a fun, friendly way - and which saw Victoria achieve over 40% of participation across the country; and my first year as CEO. All exciting developments.

The year started for me with a seven-month tour of the State, visiting clubs, associations and councils. I was thrilled with the welcome I received at every club I visited. People opened up, told me what worked well and helped me understand the improvements that need to be made. I was especially pleased to hear such positive feedback about the team at Tennis Victoria - this tour was a real highlight, an education and a great way for me to meet hundreds of volunteers and coaches who lead tennis and drive so many of our successes. Thank you to everyone who hosted me, helped me settle in as CEO and helped me understand the needs of our affiliates.

As a result of this tour, Tennis Victoria has started work on a new strategy to transform our offer to our affiliates and modernise delivery of our great game. We look forward to consulting on this next year and publishing a new strategy. This Annual Report completes the work achieved on the strategy to 2020.

Of course there was another 'first' that created many challenges; the first global pandemic that Tennis Victoria has had to address. For the first time, we closed the gates to our courts and the doors to our clubhouses. As we approach the end of the financial year we are still in lockdown and adapting to a new world. We've supported clubs and coaches with guidelines for reopening safely when this is possible and provided clubs with everything you need from QR codes for tracking participants at a venue to hand sanitiser to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. We've worked closely with Tennis Australia to make the case for tennis to Government and to secure funding for clubs and associations for COVID recovery. We will continue to advocate for our stakeholders and to help you all adapt to the 'new normal'. The resilience of the tennis community is incredible and I'm proud to work for you. I look forward to the challenges that next year will bring and to being back on court facing the future together.

TREASURER'S REPORT



It is with great pleasure that I present the 2020 Financial Year Treasurer's report.

FY20 was a unique year due to the significant impact of COVID-19

during the final quarter of the year. At that time the Board took several steps to reduce risk, protect our financial position and balance sheet, and maintain financial liquidity and flexibility. Measures included reducing operating expenses, accessing various sources of government support and obtaining relief from our lease obligations for our offices.

The steps taken by the Board to protect Tennis Victoria's financial position led to the surplus position

of \$581,503 (FY19: \$196,723). In turn, Total Members' Funds have increased to \$3,082,598 (FY19: \$2,501,095).

As part of the Board's planning for the future, it has approved a deficit budget for 2020-21, with the intention that the 2019-20 surplus is effectively utilised in 2020-21. This will allow Tennis Victoria to maintain its operational capacity and service delivery, without a material impact to the balance sheet from the levels at the commencement of 2019-20.

During the year funding from Tennis Australia increased to \$4,565,760 (FY19: \$4,309,779) and represents 68% of our revenue. The increase in funding enabled us to increase staffing capacity and leadership to provide more support for our stakeholders. The impact of salary and on-cost expenses is reflected in the increase in our largest expense item, Employee Benefits, to \$4,441,098 (FY19: \$3,869,172).

Tennis Australia's funding is provided in quarterly instalments and the amount provided in the fourth quarter of 2019-20 was reduced due to the impact of COVID-19. Tennis Australia has indicated a reduced level of funding for 2020-21, which has been incorporated into our budget.

Despite investment market volatility and declines due to COVID-19, our investment valuation at year end remained healthy at \$2,301,729 (FY19: \$2,427,767) due to our conservative asset allocation. Cash reserves remain healthy at \$1,683,857 (FY19: \$995,276), which is sufficient for the day-to-day operation of the business, particularly noting the deficit budget for 2020-21.

Rallying Together

When we talked about 2020 being a transformational year no one could have possibly envisaged the magnitude of change we are enduring. The positive transformation

we were planning involved a fresh, new look summer and a widespread and inspired effort to entice new generations to our sport and keep them with us.

Incredibly, despite the enormous challenges of some of the worst bushfires in our nation's history, we still managed to achieve a large part of what we set out to do. And then along came an unprecedented global pandemic.

These enormous challenges have tested our sport, our teams and our communities. We have come together like never before. Along the way they have also amplified the public appreciation for the game we all love. It remains a passion, a delight and a part of our everyday lives – in good times and bad.

Aces for bushfire relief

The community outpouring for those affected by the bushfires was a reminder of all that is good about Australia. This support inspired The Aces for Bushfire Relief campaign which was tremendously backed by the global tennis community, many of whom have called Australia home each January for years. We not only raised \$6.1m for those in need, but raised

worldwide awareness of the plight of those who suffered from this natural disaster.

A personal highlight for me was the AO Rally for Relief, which brought together our staff, players, officials, partners and fans for a show beamed into lounge rooms across the globe. It demonstrated the enormous power of good that our sport can do, while creating long lasting memories, like that of volunteer firefighter Deb Borg teaming up with her hero Rafa in front of a packed Rod Laver Arena and a global audience of millions.

All that good work continues as our charitable arm, the Australian Tennis Foundation, works with some of the towns hardest hit by the bushfires to help in the rebuild of not just tennis facilities, but the spirit of those communities.

Our Aussie number one

How could we summarise the year without headlining the amazing performances of Ash Barty who rose to the top of the world rankings with such aplomb and grace that she captured the hearts of fans all over the world. Ash became the first Australian woman to finish the year-end as number one on the WTA Tour.

Along the way, Ash deservedly scooped up many major accolades and awards off the court, including the 2019 Newcombe Medal, WTA Player of the Year, the Don, Person and Sportswomen of the Year at the Dreamtime Awards and three AIS awards.

On the court, she led our Aussie Fed Cup team to its first final in 26 years in front of a packed RAC Arena in Perth.

Unfortunately, the French team was too strong and we lost 3:2 in the last Fed Cup competition to be held in its current format. She is our nation's most prominent athlete who carries herself in a manner that can only inspire future generations to pick up a racquet.

A new-look summer

The summer brought a new era in tennis with the launch of the ATP Cup in Perth, Brisbane and Sydney. The Aussie men led by Nick Kyrgios and Alex de Minaur defeated Greece, Canada and Germany to top the table in the group stages held at a packed Pat Rafter Arena in Brisbane. They moved into the Final Eight in Sydney where they beat Great Britain in the quarterfinals, before losing to Spain in the semis.

The event generated 93 million hours of viewing worldwide which was an 85 percent increase on previous week one tournaments. As we look to grow the Australian summer of tennis and provide more opportunities for the world's best players to compete in more capital cities, we hope to improve on these numbers.

Ash Barty quickly recovered from her loss in the doubles final of the Brisbane International to claim the inaugural Adelaide International title. Her summer success didn't end there, when Ash became the first Aussie woman to reach the Australian Open semifinals since Wendy Turnbull in 1984.

Nick Kyrgios's run at the Australian Open was also inspiring. He recovered from a gruelling five set match against Russia's Karen Khachanov to take on Rafa Nadal in the fourth round on Rod Laver Arena.


Dylan Alcott continued his success in Melbourne by winning his sixth-straight Australian Open quads title. He also again teamed up with fellow Victorian Heath Davidson to win the doubles.

A new mission for player development

Another major initiative this last year has been the implementation of our new player development strategy, which we released after more than 18 months of consultation, 150 interviews, workshops and surveys with players, coaches, parents, staff and global experts.

This new strategy has been implemented from a position of strength and the mission is to simply enable every player, coach and support team to be the best they can be.

There are many different pathways and goals for different individuals. We want to enable everyone to find his or her own way, while providing the right level of support in the areas of need, at the appropriate time. We aim to do this by providing more opportunities to more players, adopting a team-based approach, better integrating with the private coaching sector and ensuring our programs are inclusive and have broad goals.



COVID-19

Little did we know the bushfire disaster was only the beginning of our challenges for 2020. As the summer drew to a close, the pandemic enveloped our shores and seeped into our communities. We knew our response had to be both measured and swift. From the start, our decisions have been in accordance with some key guiding principles:

- We operate and maintain a safe working environment for our staff and the broader tennis community (players, coaches, officials and clubs)
- We remain financially sound for the long-term health and viability of the game in Australia
- Our behaviours align with our values of:
 - Imagination
 - Collaboration
 - Humility
 - Excellence.

There have been some tough decisions made this year and there will be more. The second wave in Victoria has tested the entire nation. But we know that we have a unique sport which complies with physical distancing and hygiene protocols, with

limited impact on how it's played. Ours is a sport that can help the community cope with all that comes with this pandemic and also help many recover from it – be it for their physical or mental health. We remain committed to getting through this and hosting another great summer of events – along with helping the morale of this sport-loving nation.

Thank you

It gives me great pride to be associated with a sporting community that has shown so much resilience and class in the face of adversity. There has been so much time off the court for our coaches, players and participants and it has been a struggle for many. Regardless of the challenges that remain, we will continue to find a way forward by working collaboratively and with great care for one another.

OPPORTUNITIES TO PLAY

Open Court Sessions

The final element of our five-year plan to provide more opportunities for people to play tennis saw us developing a new tennis experience to attract the 5 million 25-45 year old players who had 'lapsed' from the game and not picked up a racquet for a while. Our goal: To create a playing experience that would excite and re-engage them with the game they used to love.

And so, Open Court Sessions was created, with a focus on fun and social play. Launching during the Australian Open, our target group of lapsed players were encouraged to 'Get Your Racquet On' and have a hit at an Open Court Session.



The planning began in August 2019 and after a launch event at our Community Tennis Forum in October, 282 clubs partnered with Tennis Victoria to deliver Open Court Sessions throughout February and March 2020. Each club recruited at least 2 hosts to run Open Court Sessions at their club. We ran 37 host training sessions to prepare 641 hosts to roll out this program. We provided a free digital platform to all of these clubs and linked them to a new website,

play.tennis.com.au to ensure our marketing reached the widest number of our target audience as possible. Victoria was pleased to have the highest Open Court Sessions participation numbers in the country, with 43% of the nation's session registrations coming from our state.

Thank you to all of our amazing clubs and hosts - we look forward to rebooting Open Court Sessions next summer and bringing even more people back to tennis.

ANZ Tennis Hot Shots

Through coaching, community play, Match Play, School programs and ANZ Tennis Hot Shots Racquet Roadshows, our ANZ



Tennis Hot Shots program continued to offer a variety of opportunities for children to become involved in tennis.

Tennis Victoria partnered with 1083 primary schools and 90 secondary schools to deliver tennis in schools through Sport Australia's Sporting Schools initiative.

We continued to offer Victorian coaches on court initiatives for ANZ Tennis Hot Shots at the Australian Open and the Kooyong Classic, proving a wonderful opportunity for coaches and their students to experience these world class events.



Tennis 4 Teens

In its second year, the Tennis 4 Teens program was delivered by 66 clubs. This means we have now had 752 teens take part in the program to date. This year Tennis Victoria launched a dedicated Tennis 4 Teens website and Instagram page to support clubs, participants and facilitators by providing a one-

stop-shop for all their program needs.

The success of this program in Victoria has not gone unnoticed and backed by Federal Government funding, Tennis 4 Teens is now being piloted in other states as part of Tennis Australia's 'Females in Tennis' initiative. Huge thanks to VicHealth for their ongoing support of this initiative.

Tennis 4 Teens is striking a chord with participants with a retention rate of 61% once players have signed up for the program. Engagement with players has been pleasing to see with many participants helping to drive the content of their Tennis 4 Teens sessions with excellent collective engagement with the programs Instagram page.

Tennis Victoria continued to work with coaches and clubs to promote further opportunities to play including Cardio Tennis, Book a Court casual court hire, competitions, tournaments, regional team events and Country Week.






PLAYERS WITH AN AUSTRALIAN RANKING

Facilities and their management

Book a Court

With 46% of all Book a Court venues across the country, we are extremely proud to have 111 Victorian tennis clubs able to enhance their offer to members and the local community thanks to the Book a Court system and technology. These forward-thinking clubs are able to provide a great customer experience for their community and have a vastly reduced admin burden thanks to the automation of the system. Thanks to these Clubs, over \$650,000 in court bookings was invested back into the tennis community this year.

“To finish on a high note, Book a Court has been a success - it has brought in extra income (amazing amount) which will help us upgrade the courts, it has brought in a lot of locals in and many have joined, and it allowed us to keep operating through some of the earlier restrictions. And because they had to, members have become used to using the system now.” - Fiona Raitt at Kew Tennis Club

Facility Audits

Tennis Victoria is committed to supporting and developing clubs and communities in the delivery of enjoyable and accessible tennis experiences. The gathering of data to provide us with a clear current 'state of play' from a facilities perspective is vital to the success of this work. The data enables Tennis Victoria to make informed decisions to support and improve tennis across the State. The Places to Play team commenced data collection by undertaking a state-wide tennis infrastructure audit, comprising a basic assessment of courts, lighting, fencing, grounds and surrounds and clubhouse facilities.

With over 1250 venues throughout the State, it was a comprehensive process and by the time COVID-19 halted operations in March, 66% of country Victoria and 21% of metro Melbourne venues had been audited.

Facilities Framework 2025

Tennis Victoria's Places to Play Key Directions to 2020 outlined the case for investment in new tennis facilities from 2015-2020. It recognised the need for Tennis Victoria to work closely in partnership with venue owners to support refurbishing existing facilities and to develop appropriate operational and management arrangements to ensure all our facilities are thriving and welcoming for players. During 2019-20 we undertook a review to update our Key Directions for 2020-25. COVID-19 has inevitably caused a delay in completing this update, but we will resume in the new financial year ensuring we have the evidence and data needed to guide facilities planning and investment.

Youth Development

The Future Leaders program continued in 2019/20 with 33 students graduating from the program in January 2020. The graduates contributed a minimum of 1320 hours to their community tennis clubs including projects focusing on junior participation, social media and marketing, fundraising and sponsorship and club events.

Supporting youth development included the continued relationship with SEDA College offering students work placements and valuable industry experience at many of our events

Player Support Program

There were 69 junior players in the 2020 Player Support Program.

Victorian players in the Top 50 Australian Ranking for their birth year are invited

into the program. Players must be born between the birth years of 2004 - 2009 to be eligible.

The program is designed to complement a player's regular training and continues to provide match play opportunities for highly ranked Victorian juniors from across the state.



Coaching

The Victorian Coaching Team support our coaching network to deliver safe and inclusive experiences for their players; and enjoy positive and productive relationships with their clubs. This involves working with coaches in their own environments on their on-court program and running their

business. Adding value in this way includes providing resources around the employment of staff; upskilling to deliver best practice programming; and connecting coaches with the Schools or Inclusion team for specialist skills. The team works closely with the Tennis Australia Coach Membership and Education teams so coaches can gain maximum benefit from their membership and access the education pathway.

The Tennis Australia Coach Education pathway has achieved Gold Level recognition by the International Tennis Federation and creates multiple opportunities for coaches to pursue their career. We are committed to developing a strong coaching workforce to drive the sport in clubs and venues across Victoria. From entry level options to nationally recognised VET qualifications these courses provide world class education and critical training in Safeguarding children.

Tennis Victoria continued to partner with various stakeholders to support events, deliver programs and create a variety of playing opportunities and safe and inclusive venues for tennis participants.

Tennis Victoria partnered with Kooyong Lawn Tennis Club to support the Kooyong Classic, providing the biggest 'Play Tennis' zone to date. This saw children and adults enjoying time away from the court between matches and having a go at some fun tennis games to spark their interest to pick up a racquet back at home.



We were again fortunate to occupy the lawn tennis courts at Government House on the Australia Day Open Day providing visitors an opportunity to have a hit on these beautiful courts.

ACE Grants

This initiative engaged with Muslim Women and their children to provide them with great tennis experiences. The initiative saw the development of local partnerships to support the sustainability of the programs developed. Movement Disorder Foundation

Gender Equality Pilot Project

Following an extension of funding, and based on the pilot's initial success, we were able to take our learnings and work with a further 5 clubs on how best to embed gender equality practices. Time has been spent upskilling the delivery team and defining an implementation process (including the development of resources) aimed at supporting staff and clubs who wish to place a gender lens to their club operations. We thank the Office for Women and the Office for Women in Sport and Recreation for their ongoing support of this initiative.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activities of the Association during the financial year were the promotion and development of the game of tennis in Victoria. These activities were conducted under the registered trading name of Tennis Victoria.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES

No significant change in the nature of these activities occurred during the year.

GOING CONCERN

As noted in Note 18, the Association is economically dependent upon Tennis Australia and receives grant funding that forms an integral part of the funding required for the Association to achieve its short and long term objectives. As part of the directors' consideration of the appropriateness of adopting the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements, a range of scenarios have been reviewed. The assumptions modelled are based on the estimated potential impact of COVID-19 restrictions and regulations, along with our proposed responses over the course of the next 12 months. These include a range of estimated impacts primarily based on length of time, the various levels of restrictions in place and the severity of the consequent impact of those restrictions on Tennis Victoria. In response, the Association has introduced cost control measures and other actions to preserve the cash position of the Association going forward. In the unlikely event that grant funding from Tennis Australia Limited should cease, or be reduced, it is the view of the officers that the Association would still be able to continue meeting the above objectives, albeit to a lesser extent.

The Directors have concluded that it is appropriate that these financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis, taking regard of the above and while acknowledging the uncertainties around forecasting financials in the COVID-19 environment. The Directors acknowledge that such uncertainties do not represent material uncertainties related to going concern.

OPERATING RESULT

The operating result for the year ended 30 June 2020 was a surplus of \$581,503 (2019: \$196,723).

In December 2019, COVID-19 emerged and has subsequently spread worldwide. The World Health Organisation has declared COVID-19 a pandemic resulting in federal, state and local governments mandating various restrictions, including travel restrictions, restrictions on public gatherings, stay at home orders and advisories and quarantining of people who may have been exposed to the virus.

COVID-19 affected Tennis Victoria's business in the fourth quarter of the financial year. The Board took several steps to reduce risk, protect our financial position and balance sheet, and maintain financial liquidity and flexibility. Measures included reducing operating expenses, accessing various sources of government support and obtaining relief from our lease obligations for our offices.

The steps taken by the Board to protect Tennis Victoria's financial position led to the surplus position of \$581,503. As part of the Board's planning for the future, it has approved a deficit budget for 2020-21, with the intention that the 2019-20 surplus is effectively utilised in 2020-21. This will allow Tennis Victoria to maintain its operational capacity, without a material impact to the balance sheet from the levels at the commencement of 2019-20.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

The financial statements cover Victorian Tennis Association Inc. ('Association') as an individual entity. Victorian Tennis Association Inc. is an association incorporated in Victoria and operating pursuant to the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012.

The registered office of the Association and principal place of business is:

The Association is a not for profit entity and the principal activities of the Association during the course of the financial year were the promotion and development of the game of tennis in Victoria.

NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES Basis of Preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012, Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements, Accounting Interpretations and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board. For the purposes of preparing the financial statements, the Association is a not for profit entity. The financial statements were authorised for issue by the Board on 23 September 2020.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions to which they apply. Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

This is the first set of the annual financial statements in which AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers, AASB 1058 Income of Not-for-Profit Entities, and AASB 16 Leases has been applied. The Association initially applied AASB 16 as at 1 July 2019 in accordance with the modified retrospective approach. Under this approach, comparative information is not restated and the cumulative effect of initially applying AASB 16 is recognised in retained earnings as at the date of initial application. Detailed disclosures in relation to the application of AASB 16 are provided in Notes 1(d), 11 and 13 to these financial statements.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The financial statements have been prepared in Australian dollars which is the Association's functional and presentation currency. All values are rounded to the nearest dollar.

Accounting Policies

a. Income Tax

The Association is exempt from income tax.

b. Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

c. Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment is measured on the cost basis and is therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than its estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to its estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present (refer to Note 1(f) for details of impairment).

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, including

buildings and capitalised lease assets, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Office equipment	15-50%

Technical and tournament equipment	30-50%

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are included in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

d. Leases

The Association has applied AASB 16 using the modified retrospective approach and therefore the comparative information has not been restated and continues to be reported under AASB 117 and AASB Interpretation 4.

Policy applicable from 1 July 2019

At inception of a contract, the Association assesses whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. To assess whether a contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, the Association uses the definition of a lease in AASB 16.

This policy is applied to contracts entered into, on or after 1 July 2019.

(i) As a lessee Initial recognition and measurement

At commencement or on modification of a

contract that contains a lease component, the Association allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of its relative standalone prices. However, for the leases of property the Association has elected not to separate non-lease components and account for the lease and non-lease components as a single lease component.

The Association recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located, less any lease incentives received.

The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the end of the lease term, unless the lease transfers ownership of the underlying asset to the Association by the end of the lease term or the cost of the right-of-use asset reflects that the Association will exercise a purchase option. In that case the right-of-use asset will be depreciated over the useful life of the underlying asset, which is determined on the same basis as those of property and equipment. In addition, the right-of-use asset is periodically reduced by impairment losses, if any, and adjusted for certain re-measurements of the lease liability.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the Association's incremental borrowing rate.

Generally, the Association uses its incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate.

The Association determines its incremental borrowing rate by obtaining interest rates from various external financing sources and makes certain adjustments to reflect the terms of the lease and type of the asset leased.

Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability comprise the following:

- fixed payments, including in-substance fixed payment
- variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, initially measured using the index or rate as at the commencement date;
- amounts expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee; and
- the exercise price under a purchase option that the Association is reasonably certain to exercise, lease payments in an optional renewal period if the Association is reasonably certain to exercise an extension option, and penalties for early termination of a lease unless the Association is reasonably certain not to terminate early.

The lease liability is measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. It is remeasured when there is a change in future lease payments arising from a change in an index or rate, if there is a change in the Association's estimate of the amount expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee, if the Association changes its assessment of whether it will exercise a purchase, extension or termination option or if there is a revised in substance fixed lease payment.

When the lease liability is remeasured in this way, a corresponding adjustment is made to

the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset, or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero. The Association presents right-of-use assets that do not meet the definition of investment property in property, plant and equipment and lease liabilities in loans and borrowings in the statement of financial position.

Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

The Association has elected not to recognise right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for leases of low-value assets and short-term leases, including IT equipment. The Association recognises the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

At inception or on modification of a contract that contains a lease component, the Association allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of their relative stand-alone prices.

(ii) Practical expedient for COVID-19 rent concessions

During the reporting period, Melbourne and Olympic Parks waived 100% of the rental fee of the Association for the period 1 January 2020 to 31 December 2020. AASB 16 provides a practical expedient for rent concessions that meet specified criteria. The rent concession arrangements provided to the Association met the necessary criteria. As a consequence of applying the practical expedient to these concessions, the Association recognised a gain of \$131,345 as Other Income in the profit or loss for the reporting period.

Policy applicable before 1 July 2019 Operating lease payments

This policy is applied to contracts entered into before 1 July 2019.

Payments made under operating leases are recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised as an integral part of the total lease expense, over the term of the lease.

e. Financial Instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Trade receivables issued are initially recognised when they originated. All other financial assets and financial liabilities are initially recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

A financial asset (unless it is a trade receivable without a significant financing component) or financial liability is initially measured at fair value plus, for an item not at fair value through profit & loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to its acquisition or issue. A trade receivable without a significant financing component is initially measured at the transaction price.

Classification and subsequent measurement

On initial recognition, the Association classifies its financial assets into the following categories, instruments measured at:

- amortised cost;
- fair value through profit or loss - FVTPL; and
- fair value through other comprehensive income - equity instrument (FVOCI - equity).

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Association changes its business model for managing financial assets, in which case all affected financial assets are reclassified on the first day of the first reporting period following the change in the business model.

A financial asset is measured at amortised cost if it meets both of the following conditions and is not designated as at FVTPL:

- it is held within a business model whose

objective is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and

- its contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

A debt investment is measured at FVOCI if it meets both of the following conditions and is not designated as at FVTPL:

- it is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets; and
- its contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

On initial recognition of an equity investment that is not held for trading, the Association may irrevocably elect to present subsequent changes in the investment's fair value in OCI. This election is made on an investment-by-investment basis. The Association doesn't hold equity instruments - fair value through other comprehensive income.

All financial assets not classified as measured at amortised cost or FVOCI are measured at FVTPL. This includes all derivative financial assets. On initial recognition, the Association may irrevocably designate a financial asset that otherwise meets the requirements to be measured at amortised cost or at FVOCI as at FVTPL if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces an accounting mismatch that would otherwise arise.

Financial assets - Business model assessment

The Association makes an assessment of the objective of the business model in which a financial asset is held at a portfolio level because this best reflects the way the business is managed and information is provided to management. Due to the nature of activities of Association the main business model within the Association is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows.

Transfers of financial assets to third parties in transactions that do not qualify for derecognition are not considered sales for this purpose, consistent with the Association's continuing recognition of the assets.

Financial assets that are held for trading or are managed and whose performance is evaluated on a fair value basis are measured at FVTPL.

Financial assets - Assessment whether contractual cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest.

For the purposes of this assessment, 'principal' is defined as the fair value of the financial asset on initial recognition. 'Interest' is defined as consideration for the time value of money and for the credit risk associated with the principal amount outstanding during a particular period of time and for other basic lending risks and costs (e.g. liquidity risk and administrative costs), as well as a profit margin.

In assessing whether the contractual cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest, the Association considers the contractual terms of the financial asset. This includes assessing whether the financial asset contains a contractual term that could change the timing or amount of contractual cash flows such that it would not meet this condition.

A prepayment feature is consistent with the solely payments of principal and interest criterion if the prepayment amount represents unpaid amounts of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding, which may include reasonable additional compensation for early termination of the contract.

Financial assets - Subsequent measurement and gains and losses

Financial assets at FVTPL

These assets are subsequently measured at fair value. Net gains and losses, including any interest or dividend income, are recognised in profit or loss.

Financial assets at amortised cost

These assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The amortised

cost is reduced by impairment losses. Interest income, foreign exchange gains and losses and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Any gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in profit or loss.

f. Impairment of Assets

Financial assets (including receivables)

AASB 9's impairment requirements use more forward-looking information to recognise expected credit losses - the 'expected credit losses (ECL) model'. Instruments within the scope of the new requirements include loans and other debt-type financial assets measured at amortised cost.

The Association makes use of a simplified approach in accounting for trade and other receivables and records the loss allowance at the amount equal to the expected lifetime credit losses. In using this practical expedient, the Association uses its historical experience, external indicators and forward-looking information to calculate the expected credit losses using a provision matrix.

Non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Association assesses whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. The assessment will consider both external and internal sources of information. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of that asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and its value-in-use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is immediately recognised in profit or loss. Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

g. Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

h. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks and other financial institutions, and other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

i. Revenue and Other Income

Revenue and other income policy after 1 July 2019. Revenue recognition policy for revenue from contracts with customers (AASB 15)

AASB 15 requires revenue to be recognised when control of a promised good or service is passed to the customer at an amount which reflects the expected consideration. The customer for these contracts is the fund provider.

Revenue is recognised by applying a five-step model as follows:

- 1) Identify the contract with the customer
- 2) Identify the performance obligations
- 3) Determine the transaction price
- 4) Allocate the transaction price
- 5) Recognise revenue

Generally, the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

None of the revenue streams of the Association have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of funds and satisfaction of performance obligations. Costs are recognised on an accrual basis.

Grant income from Government and Tennis Australia

Grant income arising from an agreement which contains enforceable and sufficiently specific performance obligations is recognised when control of each performance obligations is satisfied. This is generally the case for the monies from the Government and the performance obligations are varied based on the agreement.

Within grant agreements there may be some performance obligations where control transfers at a point in time and others which have continuous transfer of control over the life of the contract.

Where control is transferred over time, generally the revenue is recognised based on either cost or time incurred which best reflects the transfer of control.

Affiliation fees

Revenue from affiliation fees is recognised in the profit or loss in proportion to the stage of completion of the transaction at the reporting date. The stage of completion is assessed by reference to the period to which membership relates.

Revenue recognition policy for revenue streams which are either not enforceable or do not have sufficiently specific performance obligations (AASB 1058)

Grant income

Assets arising from grants in the scope of AASB 1058 are recognised at their fair value when the asset is received. These assets are generally cash but may be property which has been donated or sold to the Association at significantly below its fair value.

Once the asset has been recognised, the Association recognises any related liability amounts. Once the assets and liabilities have been recognised then income is recognised for any difference between the recorded asset and liability.

Significant estimates and judgements relating to revenue

For many of the grant agreements received, the determination of whether the contract includes sufficiently specific performance obligations was a significant judgement involving discussions with several parties at the Association, review of the proposal documents prepared during the grant application phase and consideration of the terms and conditions.

Grants received by the Association have been accounted for under both AASB 15 and AASB 1058 depending on the terms and conditions and decisions made.

If this determination was changed then the revenue recognition pattern would be different from that recognised in this financial report.

Revenue and other income policy prior to 1 July 2019

Revenue is recognised when the right to receive it is established, except in the instance of grants linked to a specific commitment to expend funds in a future period. Interest and Investment revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Reciprocal grants

Grants received on the condition that specified services should be delivered or conditions fulfilled are considered reciprocal. Such grants are initially recognised as a liability and revenue recognised as services are performed or conditions fulfilled.

Non-reciprocal grants

Where a grant is received where there is no performance obligation or return obligation, revenue is recognised when the grant is received or receivable.

j. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position. Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities, which are recoverable from or payable to the ATO, are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

k. Changes in Significant Accounting Policies

The Association initially applied the below standards from 1 July 2019. A number of other new standards are also effective from 1 July 2019 but they do not have a material effect on the Association's financial statements.

AASB 16 Leases

The Association has applied AASB 16 Leases from 1 July 2019 using the modified retrospective approach, under which the cumulative effect of initial application is recognised in retained earnings at 1 July 2019. Accordingly, the comparative information presented for the year ended 30 June 2019 is not restated - i.e. it is presented, as previously reported under AASB 117 and related interpretations. The details of the changes in accounting policies are disclosed below. Additionally, the disclosure requirements in AASB 16 have not generally been applied to comparative information.

(i) Definition of a lease

At inception of a contract, the Association assesses whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

(ii) As a lessee

As a lessee, the Association leases a few assets mainly consisting of property and equipment. The Association previously classified leases as operating or finance leases based on its assessment of whether the lease transferred significantly all of the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of the underlying asset to the Association. Under AASB 16, the Association recognises right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for these leases - i.e. these leases are on-balance sheet.

The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the end of the lease term, unless the lease transfers ownership of the underlying asset to the Association by the end of the lease term or the cost of the right-of-use asset reflects that the Association will exercise a purchase option.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the Association's incremental borrowing rate.

(iii) Leases classified as operating leases under AASB 117

Previously, the Association classified property leases as operating leases under AASB 117. On transition, for these leases, lease liabilities were measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments, discounted at the Association's incremental borrowing rate as at 1 July 2019.

The Association used a number of practical expedients when applying AASB 16 to leases previously classified as operating leases under AASB 117. In particular, the Association:

- did not recognise right-of-use assets and liabilities for leases for which the lease term ends within 12 months of the date of initial application; and
- did not recognise right-of-use assets and liabilities for leases of low value assets.

The Association recognises the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

On transition to AASB 16, the Association recognised right-of-use assets and liabilities in respect to all leases to which it was a lessee, that had commenced as at that date, and that did not meet the necessary criteria to be classified as short-term or low value leases. The impact on transition is summarised below.

When measuring lease liabilities for leases that were classified as operating leases, the Association discounted lease payments using its incremental borrowing rate at 1 July 2019.

On transition to AASB 16 on 1 July 2019, the Association recognised right-of-use assets of \$1,123,095 and lease liabilities of \$1,123,095. There was no impact to opening retained earnings.

(iv) Impact on financial statements

AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers

The Association has adopted AASB 15 from 1 July 2019. The standard provides a single comprehensive model for revenue recognition. The core principle of the standard is that the Association shall recognise revenue to depict the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. The standard introduced a new contract-based revenue recognition model with a measurement approach that is based on an allocation of the transaction price.

AASB 1058 Income of Not-for-Profit Entities

The Association has adopted AASB 1058 from 1 July 2019.

The standard replaces AASB 1004 'Contributions' in respect to income recognition requirements for not-for-profit entities. The timing of income recognition under AASB 1058 is dependent upon whether the transaction gives rise to a liability or other performance obligation at the time of receipt. Income under the standard is recognised where: an asset is received in a transaction, such as by way of grant, or donation; there has either been no consideration transferred, or the consideration paid is significantly less than the asset's fair value; and where the intention is to principally enable the entity to further its objectives. For transfers of financial assets to the entity which enable it to acquire or construct a recognisable non-financial asset, the entity must recognise a liability amounting to the excess of the fair value of the transfer received over any related amounts recognised. Related amounts recognised may relate to contributions by owners, AASB 15 revenue or contract liability recognised, lease liabilities in accordance with AASB 16, financial instruments in accordance with AASB 9, or provisions in accordance with AASB 137. The liability is brought to account as income over the period in which the entity satisfies its performance obligation. If the transaction does not enable the entity to acquire or construct a recognisable non-financial asset to be controlled by the entity, then any excess of the initial carrying amount of the recognised asset over the related amounts is recognised as income immediately. Where the fair value of volunteer services received can be measured, a private sector not-for-profit entity can elect to recognise the value of those services as an asset where asset recognition criteria are met or otherwise recognise the value as an expense.

Impact of adoption

AASB 15, AASB 16 and AASB 1058 were adopted using the modified retrospective approach and as such comparatives have not been restated. There was no impact on opening retained profits as at 1 July 2019.

I. Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

m. Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the Association during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

n. Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

o. Income Received in Advance

The liability for income received in advance represents the unutilised amounts of income received on the condition that specified services are delivered or conditions are fulfilled. The services are usually provided or the conditions usually fulfilled within 12 months of receipt of the funds. Where the amount received is in respect of services to be provided over a period that exceeds 12 months after the reporting date or the conditions will only be satisfied more than 12 months after the reporting date.

p. Key Estimates - Impairment

The Association assesses impairment at the end of each reporting period by evaluation of conditions and events specific to the Association that may be indicative of impairment triggers. Recoverable amounts of relevant assets are reassessed using value-in-use calculations which incorporate various key assumptions.

q. Key Judgments - Provision for Impairment of Receivables

Included in trade and other receivables at the end of the reporting period are debts the Board has deemed unlikely to be paid. In light of ongoing review and management of aged debts, no provision for impairment has been made at 30 June 2020 (2019: \$nil).

r. Application of new and revised Accounting Standards in Current and Future Periods

During the current year, Victorian Tennis Association Inc. adopted all of the new and revised Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations applicable to its operations which became mandatory.

New accounting standards and interpretations not yet adopted

There are no standards or amendments that have been issued but not yet effective that are expected to have a significant impact on the Association.

The Association has not adopted, and currently does not anticipate adopting any standards prior to their effective dates.

Opinion

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, management is responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Association's financial reporting process.

Auditor's responsibility for the audit of the financial report

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of this financial report.

As part of an audit in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by those charged with governance.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial report or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial report, including the disclosures, and whether the financial report represents the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
